


Goals of Expo 2025 Osaka Kansai

Achievement of Japan's national strategy Society 5.0

"Society 5.0" is Japan's national strategy to develop a human-centered society that progresses economically and resolves social issues through a system that combines both cyber and physical spaces in a sophisticated manner. It refers to a new form of society chronologically following hunting, farming, industry, and information societies.

A society that is able to resolve a variety of issues on a global scale with technologies such as the Internet of Things (IoT), Artificial Intelligence (AI), robotics, big data, and biotechnology is a society that will have achieved the SDGs.



SAVING LIVES

At Expo 2025 in Osaka, thanks to the respect Japan shows towards Bulgaria and the efforts of the Republic of Bulgaria, our country will once again have its own pavilion in a prime location on the impressive island specially built for the exhibition.

The island, designed in a ring, symbolizes unity in diversity, following the principles of decentralization and harmonious distribution. It serves as a platform for innovation and cultural exchange and a reflection of the Expo's theme – "Designing Future Society for Our Lives."

The Bulgarian pavilion is strategically positioned near one of the main entrances of the exhibition, between the pavilions of Singapore and the Netherlands. This theme has inspired us to present it through collaboration and empathy, with a vision for innovation and the future, uniting tradition and technology to pursue sustainable development and preserve life.







The pavilion is designed to blend allure and

mystery, capturing the attention of visitors walking along the ring roof of the Expo while subtly concealing its true essence.


The distinctive facade, crafted from threads, creates a dynamic composition that simultaneously filters and teases glimpses of the interior, with its visibility shifting based on the observer's angle. This design strikes a harmonious balance between transparency and density, while the rotating pattern introduces a kinetic element, turning the pavilion into a rich, multilayered visual and spatial experience.

An experience available to the 30 million visitors worldwide, expected at Expo 2025 over the six months of global dialogue in Osaka. So far, 5 months before its opening, around 8 million tickets have already been sold. Undoubtedly, Osaka, Kansai, will be one of the most attractive locations in 2025.

From a spatial perspective, the pavilion combines traditional elements with contemporary interactive technologies, creating not only a modern design and conceptually clean space but also an authentic and immersive digital experience. Carefully woven references to traditional crafts, such as weaving, and natural symbols establish parallels between Bulgaria and Japan.

In the Pavilion of the Republic of Bulgaria, as well as in others, circular economy principles and sustainability take center stage. Ecological values are embedded in every conceptual decision, particularly in the choice of materials. The pavilion is a temporary structure, and after its six-month lifecycle, every part of it will be recycled or repurposed.

Welcome to the Bulgaria Pavilion and say hi to Lacto-chan! The mascot of the Bulgarian Pavilion represents a large, friendly bacterium with a round, fluffy body.

The name Lacto-chan signifies the bond between Bulgaria and Japan, blending science, culture, and friendship.

Lacto comes from Lactobacillus bulgaricus – the unique Bulgarian bacterium that is the foundation of the worldrenowned yogurt. This bacterium is not only a part of Bulgaria's heritage but also a hero in global science, promoting health and longevity.

Chan is a Japanese suffix used to express affection and warmth. It is often added to the names of children or cute characters to make them endearing and friendly. By adding "chan," the name expresses closeness and respect, highlighting the warmth and tenderness characteristic of Japanese culture.

By choosing "chan," the name Lacto-chan builds a bridge between Bulgaria's traditions and Japan's heartfelt culture.

Lacto-chan is not just a mascot – it is a friend to children and an ambassador of the future, symbolizing innovation, health, and harmony. It will bring joy to the visitors at Expo 2025, reminding everyone how bacteria, even in their simplicity, work together to create life, health, and balance – just as people can unite their efforts to build a better world.






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Collaboration and empathy are the foundation for creating a better world. The design proposal of the pavilion is based on the idea of teamwork, where different fields of knowledge come together.
